LETA911 is becoming NoCoAlerts.org

On May 22, 2008, an EF3 tornado ripped through the heart of Windsor. For many, it was a day that caused residents to keep their eye to sky during future storms.



With the history of the Windsor tornado in mind, please have a family emergency plan in place, create and store an emergency kit in your home and vehicle, and sign up for LETA911 notifications. Windsor partners with LETA911.org to provide free emergency notifications and although it's advertised primarily as a service for Larimer County residents, our town's partnership allows all Windsor residents access to notifications in both Weld and Larimer County.

In May, LETA911.org is expected to seamlessly switch to NoCoAlert.org. Existing subscribers will not have to change anything. For questions about the change to NoCoAlert.org, call or text 970-962-2173.

# REDUCE YOUR USE

## How You Can Conserve Water and Lower Your Monthly Bill

About 72% of Windsor Water Utility residential customers showed an increase in their April water consumption. If you notice your Windsor Utility bill is a little higher this month, it's likely because you used more water and not because of a leak.

If you are unable to pay your bill, contact Customer Service at 970-674-2400 to discuss arrangements.

Here are some tips for increasing your water efficiency:

Only run full loads in the dishwasher or washing machine.

Taking a bath uses more water than taking a shower.

Do not let water run while you brush your teeth, wash your face, wash your hands, etc.

Check for leaks. A constantly running toilet can waste 4.5 gallons per minute (that's nearly 6,480 gallons per day!)
